- "...provide the scientific basis for effective conservation action"
- ➤ Track At-Risk Species & Ecosystems
- ➤ Inform research and land management decisions
- ➤ Environmental law compliance (provide species lists)





Timeline

- > 1984 TNC funds NNHP for 1 year
- > 1988 Fresh start on BIA money
- ➤ 1989 PL 93-638 funding includes project review duties

Major Challenges

- 1. Simultaneously working toward economic development and conservation
- Maintaining tribal sovereignty while assisting with federal law compliance
- 3. Contributing to science while maintaining data confidentiality

- ➤ Navajo Endangered Species List
 - Protect species that are unique & important to Navajo Nation

> Listing & delisting decisions less prone to litigation


- 1. Data Request

- 4. BRCF (Biological Resource Compliance Form)


